After finally taming the ignition, crankcase pressure issues and 300 shake out miles, the BJ8 was ready for a long journey. The plan was to drive to Charleston WV and stop and watch the Bengals game then on to the hotel in Beckley WV. It was such a beautiful fall day, the BJ8 had never ran that good. We were about 100 miles out almost to our turn off at 35, then there were a few rattles then a loud boom. We coasted to a stop; smoke was coming out... and there was a 4-inch round hole in the side of the block under the manifold. For some reason the bolt on the journal on #5 piston broke. So... AAA back home with a very nice driver who happened to live a few years in NC. At home he rolled it off into the garage, we moved the luggage to Joyce's Miata and headed out again. This time straight to Beckley and listened to the Bengals on the radio. We made Beckley around night fall and were back on schedule. On Monday we made our way to Pittsboro NC. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, we had a great visit in Pittsboro with my best friend Roger and his wife Judy. We went to school (HS & Xavier) and he introduced me to Joyce. On Wednesday, October 30 three Austin Healeys met at Grove Park Grill to begin their trek to Dobson, NC for the 37th edition of the Southeast Classic. TECH SESSION



On Friday, November 15, we had six members of the OVAHC Tech Team converge on the Skip Jackson MGA shop. The experienced half-dozen mechanics included Bernie Grabow, Ken Campbell, John Wallace, Dale Ballinger, Tim Ross, and down from Dayton – Gary Rettig. Seventh member, Skip had tasty jelly-filled donut holes and Dale set up the coffee pot shortly after 9:30. Skip had the natural gas turned-on in the shop with two fireplaces for heat, so no frost inside. We immediately broke into groups without discussion, being here many times before this year. Bernie went for the RR brake cylinder installation, while John and Ken



started on the LR brake. Dale and Gary knew that the transmission needed oil, so they rigged up a funnel and hose for the slow process. Tim started with the water

and fuel hoses on the carburetor side of the engine. Skip started sanding some of the oil off the nearly new rear brake shoes, while getting the team various new parts and fasteners as needed. Later, the people switched some tasks like Gary and Dale installing the shift lever and the tunnel cover. Then Dale vacuumed the interior, reinstalled the carpet, and installed a new headlight foot-dip switch. Tim moved to the other side of the engine to install the heater water valve, actuation cable, and hose. Tim fought with the water valve installation bolt lengths, and actuation cable adjustment. After completing the new wheel cylinder swaps, the team members on the rear brakes fought with

the various brake shoe springs' installation.

After beer-o'clock- noon, we were all ready for a good Larosa's pizza and cold beverage lunch Gary and Tim started with the fitting of the new alternator before lunch, and after lunch reread the instructions. Dale and Tim finally got the belt alignment and supports right. The alter-



nator tensioner arm bolt remained which could hardly even be seen, rather than possibly being accessible with washers, nut, or a wrench. We consid-

wrench. We considered removing the



radiator (not filled yet) until Dale used a long magnet and screwdriver like a surgeon to place the washers and nut on the tensioner arm stud and tightened it blindly while Tim provided guidance and tensioned the drive belt. This involved Ken providing stability to Dale as he balanced one foot on a chair, a knee on a fender, and one hand on the valve cover. The rear brake team agreed to try finish at the next session. The old 6-volt batteries were removed for charging in anticipation of completing the alternator/ negative ground change next time. If they won't hold a charge, new ones will be installed.
